AAPI Curriculum in New York

Will New York be the next state to pass an AAPI curriculum bill? Good news could be on the way!

Seeking to stop anti-Asian hate, a consortium of Asian American groups, including OCA-WHV, have combined to urge New York lawmakers to join twelve states (NJ, CT, IL, WI, FL, CA, CO, NE, NV, OR, RI, and UT) with statutes that require an AAPI Studies curriculum. Last November 15, local AAPI leaders, including County Legislator David Imamura, Assemblyman Nader Sayegh, Vikas Agrawal of Ardsley School Board, Marjorie Hsu, chair of the Asian American Advisory Board, and OCA-WHV board members Bill Kaung and Bhavana Pahwa, spoke out before the County Diwali celebration in support of passing Sen. John Liu's Senate Bill 5963A for AANHPI Education. It recently passed unanimously on the NY Senate Floor, guided by Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins and NY State Senator Shelley Mayer of Westchester. Let's work together to pass it in the state Assembly and get it signed by the Governor!



First AAPI Summit Held in Albany

On May 9th, 2024, the 1st Annual AAPI Summit drew more than 300 Asian Americans from across New York State to discuss and advocate for solutions to various issues impacting our communities. The Summit, organized by the New York State Assembly Asian Pacific American Task Force, featured several workshops hosted by various elected officials. OCA - WHV members presented a panel discussion on "Social Isolation in the AAPI Community" which was hosted by NY Assembly Member Chris Burdick and organized by Heather Meiko Lackey. Panel members were Westchester County Legislator David Imamura, OCA member Dr. Teresa Hsu, NY Senator Kevin Thomas, and OCA Board Member Dr. Bhavana Pahwa (pictured).



Make Us Visible NY

On May 19, Make Us Visible NY held a community event at the Scarsdale library to raise awareness of the struggle to see Asian American history taught in schools, and to rally support for the passage of the bill in New York. After their presentation, there was a lively discussion by students, tabling for activities, and Asian food. Legislator David Imamura was a guest speaker. Board member **Eric Cheng** represented OCA-WHV, which cosponsored the event.

Better Together: New Bridges Coalition Diversity and Inclusion Lunch and Learn

On April 21 at Ridge Road Park in Hartsdale, fifty members from the seven New Bridges Coalition organizations met and bonded over the food of many cultures. The goal of the event was for the attendees, who came from different races and backgrounds, to make friends with people that didn't look like them and find out that we all have points of commonality. AAPI Film Screenings in Westchester



Photographic Justice - The Corky Lee Story

On May 23, 2024, 60 people came to the White Plains library to watch the film "Photographic Justice" (premiering this month on PBS) about Asian American photographer, historian, and activist, Corky Lee. It was followed by a fascinating question and answer session with the director, producer, and executive producer. It was a moving tribute to a great Asian American Hero who advocated for every Asian American ethnic group. K-TOWN '92

On May 21, 2024, OCA-WHV collaborated with White Plains library to present their third annual AAPI documentary for Asian Heritage Month. The evening began with a viewing of the short documentary "K-TOWN '92: Reporters" by Korean American filmmaker Grace Lee, who interviewed four Los Angeles Times staffers about their coverage of the Los Angeles riots 25 years before. The audience then toured the interactive project K-Town '92, a website offering hundreds of short interviews of eyewitnesses from many backgrounds. The audience considered the genesis of the uprising and the role of media bias in the coverage of the events of 1992.

Wolf Totem | Zero to Hero

The Westchester Asian Film Alliance at Scarsdale Library regularly attracts a packed, lively audience of residents from Westchester.

The featured film for April was "Wolf Totem" (2015). Based on the semi-autobiographical novel by the same name, the film tells the story of an urban student during the Chinese Cultural Revolution who travels to Inner Mongolia to teach shepherds about agriculture. During his stay, he forms bonds with the local people and becomes fascinated by the wolves roaming the grasslands.

Reflecting on the experiences of the "sentdown youths" in Mongolia prompts us to contemplate humanity, the relationship between humans and nature, and Chinese culture/history. The movie's usage of real and living wolves during the filming process is another element worth highlighting. After the movie ended, many people stayed and shared their insights. One audience member said, "It's the first time I've watched a movie related to the life of youth during the Cultural Revolution. It was excellent. I hope the next event comes sooner."

In May, the film "Zero to Hero" (2021) was presented. Related to the theme of mother's day and mother appreciation, the film is based on the true story of Su Hua Wei, a medal-winning Paralympian from Hong Kong. With his mother's help, Su Hua Wei battled against his disabilities and ultimately became the first athlete from



Hong Kong to win the gold medal at the Paralympic Games.

This monthly event was founded in 2023 by YOCA member **Jayden Cao**, who organizes it with the assistance of Vice President of OCA-WHV Youth Programs and the Scarsdale Public Library. With OCA-WHV's continuous support, this event takes place on the second or third Saturday afternoon every month. Traditional Asian snacks are served.
